Sir Knight Turns 100!!!

SK Jim Smith was born on December 6, 1920, in Cleveland, OH. He joined the U.S. Marine Corps in 1939, becoming an electronics/communications specialist. He earned the nickname "Horse" (or sometimes "Horse Collar") as he was usually in a harness pulling a cart full of his section's communications gear. Volunteered for the famous USMC unit "Edson's Raiders" in 1941, he was deployed to the Solomon Islands in 1942, where he fought in the battles of Tulagi and Guadalcanal. For his service, he earned two Silver Stars and the Purple Heart. During

After World War II, SK Jim was married, and employed at Remington Rand. In 1950, he joined the Central Intelligence Agency. During his time with the CIA, he served overseas at Taiwan Islands, Manila, Hong Kong, Vietnam, Germany, and the United Kingdom, as well as a number of stateside assignments including training sites for other Intelligence Officers. He retired as a Senior Executive Service Officer in 1989.

Since retiring from the CIA, SK Jim has been active at St. Leo the Great Catholic Church, where he has been a Lector and a member of both Fr. Francis J. Diamond Council #6292 and Fr. Walter F. Malloy Assembly #1894. Additionally, he has been a rugby referee and became a World Champion Skeet Shooter. He has two recorded history videos of his World War II experiences. The first is on display at the Marine Corps Museum in Quantico, the other displayed at the WWII Memorial in New Orleans. He also participated in the groundbreaking ceremony for the World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Historian Report

Plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose.

Last month, this column reported a triumph in the culture wars: the 1954 Fourth Degree-led effort to add "Under God," to

the Pledge of Allegiance. Today we discuss the counterattack: Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State, POAU.

POAU was founded to combat proposals that would have permitted Catholic school children to use public school buses for school transport, and to oppose tax rebates or an eerily familiar debate, school vouchers for religious schools. But their mission, ostensibly arrayed against all mixtures of public policy with religion, quickly took on a distinct anti-Catholic tinge, and their first victory was derailing the appointment of an ambassador to the Holy See.

President Roosevelt, during the Second World War, had appointed a "personal representative," to the Vatican. But his successor, President Harry Truman, citing purposes of diplomacy and humanitarianism as well as the Vatican's struggle against communism, announced that full diplomatic relations with the Vatican was his policy, and he forwarded the name of General Mark W. Clark to the Senate for confirmation as ambassador to the Holy See.

And POAU lost their collective minds.

A full-scale assault against the move unfolded. Clark, who had risen to become, at the time, the youngest four-star general in Army history, was an Episcopalian with a distinguished record in Europe commanding Fifth Army, and, in the conduct of the Italian campaign, had met with His Holiness Pope Pius XII at the end of the war. But to POAU, this was nothing less than a plan to hand over the keys to the White House to papal control, and they mobilized to scuttle the entire idea of an accredited ambassador to the Vatican. At first, Truman was unworried, writing to a friend that it was merely a "great deal of ballyhoo being stirred up by some of my bigoted Protestant friends."

But Truman did not appreciate the maelstrom that was to unfold. The initial reaction of the secular mainstream press was positive, with luminaries the New York Times, San Francisco Chronicle, and Washington Post all writing favorably of the plan. Even newspapers that opposed the plan did so for reasons unrelated to the supposed problems with separation of church and state.

But the POAU began a coordinated effort to unite Protestant leaders in opposition. The Sunday following the news of the nomination, Protestant pulpits across the country delivered the message: this was nothing less than enshrining Catholicism as mandatory. Parishioners were urged to write to the President and to their senators. The pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Rhode Island declared the move exposed "the political chicanery of the Roman Catholic Church," while an evangelical rally in St. Louis distributed 10,000 opposition postcards for attendees to fill out, then

collected them and mailed them in a giant box. Even Truman's own Baptist pastor, Rev. Edward Pruden, announced at his service that he had begged the President to withdraw the nomination.

Within a month, a "pilgrimage," of thousands of Protestants marched on Washington to deliver a scroll with 1,776 signatures opposing the move. (On a personal note, your Worthy Historian must confess a bit of mocking laughter emerged when reviewing pictures of the event: thousands of Protestants holding signs demanding that we "Keep Religion Out of Politics.")

But whatever their lapses of logic, their grasp of political pressure points was keen. In January 1952, the White House announced that President Truman was withdrawing the nomination.

POAU had won. And diplomatic relations with the Vatican would not be formalized until 1969, when President Nixon appointed a personal representative, former senator Henry Cabot Lodge. The United States did not have an ambassador in the Vatican until 1984, when President Reagan nominated diplomat William Wilson and the Senate finally agreed.

So, you might be wondering, whatever happened to POAU?

Today they are simply known as "Americans United," and are a multi-million-dollar advocacy group for anti-religious legislation and policy.
